Public Seminar Gains Mileage in Soul Winning

LAGUNA, PHILIPPINES – The two-week evangelistic campaign held in Victoria, Laguna, April 9-23, has gained 108 new members for the church and revitalized the faith of Adventists who attended the nightly meetings.

Abner S Roque, Stewardship and Trust Services director for the Adventist church in the Southern Asia-Pacific region, held this campaign with his wife Eleanor, Women's Ministries director and Education associate director for the church in the northern Philippines.

Every night, before the presentations of family life and spiritual messages, the health booths set up for the duration of the seminar conducted services on physical therapy and blood sugar tests. "The streamers displaying the health hazards of smoking, alcohol and drugs enhanced the learning of those who came nightly," remarked Pastor Roque.

On April 16, at the first Saturday baptism, 59 were baptized. Five of them were amputees on wheelchairs and crutches. They were assisted at the pool by Osias Llasos, a physical therapist serving as lay leader. On Sunday, April 17, an Adventist physician, Dr. Obriz Paglinawan, provided his services to conduct the Operation Tuli, where children of right age were given free circumcision services.

Pastor Reymundo Torres, executive secretary for the South-Central Luzon region, took four nights as speaker during Pastor Roque's absence, when the latter went to conduct a Stewardship and Trust Services certification seminar at the church headquarters in Northeastern Mindanao in Southern Philippines.

During the last Sabbath of the campaign, 49 others joined the baptism. This brought in 108 new church members resulting from the campaign.

"We were happy to know that a big percentage of those who came for the meetings were sincere searchers of truth and were baptized to the Adventist faith," said Ariel Matira, district pastor and coordinator of the event.

Roque was very impressed with the organization of the meetings for "having a strong support from the laity." He also discovered that "a combination of family and spiritual approaches was very effective in winning people to Christ as evidenced by the baptism of 98 percent of those who came nightly."

SILVER SPRING, MARYLAND - The Honorable Prime Minister of Sri Lanka Mahinda Rajapaksha and Her Excellency President Chandrika Kumratunga Badaraneyaka attended the opening ceremony for a building project in Sri Lanka for which the Adventist Development and Relief Agency (ADRA) is providing water.

ADRA will provide water to the 200 permanent houses that will be built on 78 acres of land provided by the Sri Lankan government. The development will be located in the Tangalle division of the Hambantota District of Sri Lanka, one of the areas hit the hardest by last December's tsunami. Each house will be made with environmentally friendly heat resistant bricks, and will accommodate two bedrooms, a kitchen, dining room, veranda, and an outside connecting bathroom.

Conrad Vine, acting country director of ADRA Sri Lanka, and Julio Paula, ADRA project director for the Hambantota District, represented ADRA at the ceremony held March 15.

ADRA continues its relief efforts to the tsunami survivors in Asia and Africa through projects such as the distribution of medicine, water purification systems, and livelihood support.

ADRA is present in more than 120 countries providing individual and community development and disaster relief without regard to political or religious association, age, or ethnicity.

Government Dignitaries Join Adventists' Centennial Celebration

NEGROS ORIENTAL, PHILIPPINES – The three-day celebration of the Adventist Church's presence in the Philippines, April 22-24, held at Dumaguete City, Philippines, was attended by government officials who echoed their appreciation to the church for its contribution to the progress of the region.

Organized by the Adventist church in Negros Oriental-Siquijor region in central Philippines, 5,000 church leaders and members representing 14 local districts were addressed on its opening night by the vice-mayor of the town. The Honorable Antonio Paalan, lauded the church and its members for its commitment to peace and progress and expressed elation for the opportunity of taking part in the celebrations.

Barangay (Village) Captain Amancio Desor, told the audience that "God has really been with the Seventh-day Adventist Church during the last 100 years," because of its perceived growth.

Government and Adventists in Healthy Lifestyle Festival

THE EAST VISAYAN ACADEMY campus in Talisay City, Cebu, Central Philippines, bustled with activity on May 26 and 27 when more than two thousand participants joined the Healthy Lifestyle Festival - a result of the collaborative effort of the Philippine Government through the Department of Health and the Seventh-day Adventist Church through the Health Ministries Department of the Adventist Church in the Central Philippine Region.

The festival was aimed at promoting healthy living and preventing lifestyle-related diseases such as hypertension, diabetes, etc. It offered a "one-stop-has-it-all" health service s for the public and also featured strategies for maintaining good health. These strategies included computerized health age appraisal where a person's lifespan can be determined through a person's daily routine or activities, food intake and health habits; and workshops on diets that would prevent lifestyle diseases. Lectures on CELEBRATIONS were also done. These lectures delved into what celebration represents: Choices, Exercise, Liquids, Environment, Belief, Rest, Air, Temperance, Integrity, Optimism, Nutrition, and Social Support.

Health services were also made available to the participants such as medical and dental consultations, children and dog immunizations, cholesterol and blood sugar screening, breast and cervical examinations, ECG, skin clinic and other surgical services.

Three hundred volunteers from government and Adventist hospitals—doctors, dentists, nurses, medical technologists, and radiologists offered their services. Adventist laymembers acted as health lecturers and computer encoders.

Cooking demonstrations on vegetarian food preparation were also conducted. The volunteers were treated to a scrumptious vegetarian lunch catered by a Korean Adventist couple.

The festival started with a motorcade originating from the premises of the Department of Health Office at 6:30 in the morning of May 27 which ended at the academy campus. This was followed by "Hataw," an exercise program led by the personnel of the Department of Health. The opening program was graced by the presence of important guests: Dr. Nemesio Gaco, Jr., Assistant Secretary of the Department of Health, who gave the keynote address; Dr. Binabaye, Regional Director of the Department of Health; Mayor Socrates Fernandez of Talisay City, and Pastor Jemuel Toledanes, President of the church in Central Philippines, who gave the welcome address.

The first of its kind to be launched in Central Philippines, the festival was jointly conceived and organized by Dr. Judith Tawatao, Technical Program Coordinator on Non-Communicable Diseases of the Department of Health, Region 7; and Pastor Charles Nogra, Health Ministries Director of the Adventist Church in the Central Philippine region.

Daw Betty Than Tin, a retired elementary English teacher,

language consultant and reading specialist from Maryland, USA, conducted the seminar and was participated in by English teachers from Adventist Schools in Myanmar, including that of Myanmar's only Adventist college and seminary.

Priscilla Sein, education director for the Church in Myanmar, led out in the opening ceremonies where the participants warmly welcomed Mrs. Betty Tin after almost half a century of absence from her beloved motherland. She spent forty years teaching English in the United States.

As she addressed the audience, emotions overwhelmed her but she was happy to get back to where she once came. "My dream and desire to teach here has finally come," remarked Mrs. Tin. "And I plan to be here next year to teach English, if God wills," she continued.

"I am happy that Mrs. Betty Tin has come to Myanmar. Our dream of establishing a language school is nearing reality. It will be a new page in the Adventists' history," expressed Muller Kyaw, president of the Adventist Church in Myanmar. He concluded, "I hope this English Teaching Seminar will enhance the quality of English teaching in our Adventist Schools."

"As an inspiration," remarked Kenneth Suanzanang, communication director for Myanmar, "the church in Korea established a single language school in 1969, but now it has grown to 37 with 50,000 students, and, if the work in Myanmar grows, language schools will saturate the towns and cities of Myanmar for the purpose of proclaiming the gospel."

Discipleship Training Gains New Disciples

MEIKTILA, MYANMAR – The Frontier Mission of Myanmar has lined up quarterly discipleship training seminars in 2005 and the first that was held on May 1-21, has catered to persons from different church persuasions—Buddhists, Hindus, Muslims, and other Christian denominations: Catholics, Baptists, and Pentecostals.

Conducted in Meiktila, this first of three seminars had a total attendance of 38. Of these, twelve have been receiving Bible studies. The 21-day discipleship training has dealt with Adventist Beliefs, World Religion, and Bible Studies. The second seminar is scheduled for September 1-21, and the third, before the year ends.

The doctrinal discussions were conducted by Saya Tatli and Saw Thein, both church workers for Myanmar Frontier Mission (MFM); while the topic on World Religion was conducted by U Pong Myint, another MFM worker.

"Now that the seminar has ended, Bible studies for those interested persons are continuing with Saya U Pong Myint and Saya Tatli," said Saw Thein, "and we hope to bring them to the Lord Jesus Christ through baptism."

Among several plans, a prison ministry was also established in the Meiktila Prison where three Christian inmates—Ma Khin Aye Mon, Ma Jar Taung, and Daw Ruth Abraham were admitted. "After five-months of establishing a relationship with the prisoners we finally arranged and started, on May 15, a regular worship service. We will also do this in the seven other jails in the area," concluded Saw Thein.

In a town near Meiktila, on May 21, five people were baptized as a result of a five-month pioneering work of Tin Win Naing, an MFM pioneer.

The MFM was established on November 25, 1997 by the Myanmar Union Mission to do urban evangelism in Sagaing, Pakokku, and Kyaukmyaung (Shwebo) fields. Currently, 14 urban projects are ongoing with 29 pioneer workers. Of these projects, 13 are nursery schools.

The MFM has been dependent on the benevolence of people who support the work of the courageous and committed mission pioneers. These ongoing projects are dependent upon the offerings of those who are longing for Jesus' soon return and who have eagerly dedicated their lives to finish the gospel work quickly. Evangelistic Campaign Reaps 108 Souls

SEVEN HUNDRED TO 800 people came each night to a rented Convention hall in Solo City, Central Java, West Indonesia, to attend a Reaping Evangelistic campaign that started May 23-28, with guest speaker/pastor Alberto C Gulfan, Jr., President of the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Southern Asia Pacific Division. In his nightly meetings, Pastor Gulfan used the Family Approach evangelism seminar series.

Prior to the reaping campaign, a two week health seminar was conducted by personnel from Bandung Adventist Hospital of East West Java. A number of satellite meetings were also conducted by pastors from the Adventist church in Jakarta.

At the close of the meetings with Pastor Gulfan, 82 souls were baptized, Sabbath of May 28 following the 21 who were baptized the Sabbath before totaling to 103 souls. Three of those baptized were Theology students from the Protestant university in the neighboring city.

Still very hopeful, the coordinating team continued to pray for another man to be sent by the General Conference. Then came Pastor Brian P McMahon, Amazing Facts coordinator and evangelist, and his wife, Heidi, at Eltari Airport on May 23, accompanied by Dr. Reuel Almocera, Professor at the Adventist International Institute of Advanced Studies (AIIAS) in the Philippines.

The evangelistic effort started in the evening of May 25, in a Gymnasium Hall called Gedung Olaraga Flobamora, which stands for the four major islands in the east Nusa Tenggara Province(Flo=Flores island, BA = Sumba island, Mo-Timor Island and RA-Alor Island). The gym can hold approximately 4000 people.

During the opening program, Pastor Nahum Z Nenoharan gave a brief report about the preparations made and welcomed Pastor and Mrs. Brian McMahon, Pastor Lubis from SSD, Pastor Banjarnahor, Pub-

lishing Director for the Adventist church in West Indonesia, and Pastor Sinaga from the Indonesia Publishing House in Bandung.

Mr. Johanes Kosapilawan represented the Governor of East Nusa Tenggara Province, Mr. Pieter Alexander Tallo S H, who was out of the country.

Before reading the governor's message, Kosapilawan told of his childhood when his father, a protestant pastor on the island of Timor, treated everyone who was sick in their village that eventually made their house like a hospital.

Kosapilawan challenged everyone, to not only fulfill the spiritual needs of the person, but also to be ready to meet the physical needs of those being ministered to.

Also present was Mr. Hengki Pelauphesi the Manager of TVRI Station of Kupang on Air, which broadcast the opening program all over the islands of East Nusa Tenggara province. The attendance during that night was around 2000 adults plus children.

Every night, attendance increased as people from all over the province and beyond became eager to know about the truth. Church members in Timor are farmers where their livelihood counts on every hour of toiling in the fields, but that didn't keep them from coming to the meeting place two hours earlier.

Before the beginning of this reaping effort, satellite evangelisms were held in 36 churches and companies by speakers, pastors, including the Nusa Tenggara Mission officers and staff, teachers, literature evangelists and some laymen. It reached non-Adventists and in their

testimonies, they said they had never heard about the Sabbath before. After further study of the Bible, these people started to request for a truck that could transport them and their church leader every night to the meetings of Pastor McMahon.

The people from other churches participated in leading out in the songs. Everyone believed it was the work of the Holy Spirit when every night suspicious police would come and guard the halls. Rumor had it that some of them were spies and that the devil was trying to weaken somebody's faith to affect others'.



The nightly meetings inspired the youth to support the effort by giving Bible studies to fellow students in colleges and universities around Kupang.

Literature Evangelists (LE) handed out flyers and invited their customers to the meeting. Government working church members invited officemates to the program and the Women's Ministries and Shepherdess International prepared food to support the efforts.

A five-day Literature Ministry Seminar (LMS) was held prior to the reaping campaign, as Pastor Yanthonius Notty, and Pastor Simon Petrus Rakmeni Publishing director and LMS director respectively, of the Adventist church in Nusa Tenggara; Pastor D Sinaga from the Indonesia Publishing House, Pastor J B Banjarnahor, Dr. Reuel Almocera and Pastor Johnny Lubis got together with active LEs to support student literatures evangelists during the coming vacation, and, as a result, 67 students were registered and a Student Association of Literature Evangelists (SALE) was organized.

Springer Andrew Nenoharan, one of the LEs was elected president.

Aside from these meetings, a Spirit of Prophecy seminar was held in Airnona church with Dr. Reuel Almocera and 40 people. A Literature Evangelist Convention was also held in Pantai Timor Hotel for 40 LEs.

Friday night was the finale of the whole campaign, as Pastor McMahon made an altar call and an appeal for the people to submit themselves to the Lord and 172 responded.

On Saturday, June 4, Sabbath, 17 pastors baptized 172 persons in a swimming pool of Sasando International Hotel in Kupang. Another 20 people have stepped up to be baptized. McMahon said that this has been the largest baptism he has witnessed during his ministry.

Two Missionaries and a Lady

had only a few supplies and a stipend enough for them, yet they shared them with the people in Napoles. Despite the scarcity of basic necessities, God richly blessed them through Amalia Huyong Paredes, a 76-year-old former sugarcane tenant, who opened her home to the two missionaries.

Jerry happens to have a kinow-how on common diseases like colds, stomachaches, and had brought with him some medicine from the Adventist Hospital in Bandung, Indonesia, where his brother works. He shared the medicine to the people during his visits, and his gesture of kindness made it possible for him and Jerry to hold a Bible study, which eventually resulted in the baptism of 36 persons.

Dr. Hendrik Sumendap, Sabbath School director of the Adventist Church in Southern Asia-Pacific region (SSD), conducted an evangelistic campaign on April 25-30, after being invited and told of the deep interest of the Bible study group. With a thousand people coming regularly, the brethren of Bago City church led by church elder Ronny Triko and his wife, Esther, assisted in the nightly meetings and even gave snacks. Because of this campaign 21 persons were added to the growing membership through baptism.

No church or chapel has been built for the new worshipers, which prompted Julius and Jerry to look for a piece of land. Hearing about this, Amalia willingly contributed a part of her land for the purpose.

But seeing a possibility for a church, Dr. Sumendap, Pastor Jimmy Quijote and Pastor George Victoriano talked further to Paredes on donating her whole house to be renovated for a church.

That day, Nanay, as everyone calls her, agreed to the pastors' request, saying, "I will give my house for God and you can renovate it as a new chapel and simply improve the kitchen for my sleeping quarter." Instantly, the team went to Bacolod to get the approval of Nanay's only daughter. Elder Sumendap drew the blueprint for an entire new chapel. After the baptism on Sunday, May 1, work for the new church began.

On Sabbath, May 7, only a week after work for the church started, the new converts held their worship at their new "home," and Dr. Sumendap who at that time was already in General Santos City, flew back to Bacolod to speak at this historic event.

Though the ceiling and tiles on the floor of this new chapel still need to be put in place, it is already an immeasurable blessing to have a place of worship for these new members. This village has been grateful to the support in ministry of Nanay Amalia Huyong Paderes.

The ground-breaking ceremony was held for the Silang Community Adventist Elementary School, June 12, as 160 church members celebrated a new milestone in Christian education for their children. The school will be constructed on a 1,740 square meter lot close to the church building.

Pastor Abner Roque, church elder and School Board Chairman, led a group of special guests who graced the occasion. Pastor Samuel Ilagan, district pastor, gave the welcome address to the visitors, church members and guests, while Annabelle Acosta, Education Superintendent of the church in Central Luzon (CLC), led in the opening prayer.
